RALPH'S WAR STORY

Our family's Veterans Day story that we are proud to share is not a story of war and conflict, but a story of hospitality and kindness.

My father-in-law, Ralph Watson, was drafted and then inducted into the U.S. Army on February 14, 1944. He was 26 years old. When he left for basic training, he left his wife and a son, Gordon, just 18 months old. He served heroically in France, Belgium, and Germany, earning a Bronze Star for bravery. As a runner and carrier of ammunition, he saw and experienced much. Serving through the end of the war, he was honorably discharged in November of 1945.

Ralph brought the usual "souvenirs" home from the war—a German helmet, a revolver, a dagger, etc. He also brought back lovely picture postcards and a pair of wooden shoes given to him by a wonderful Dutch family who befriended him.

Eventually, his family grew to include four sons. And these four boys were curious about their father's war experience. Ralph would bring out his collection of war memorabilia on Sunday afternoons for the boys to study. However, when asked for information on his experiences, he shared little.

One story he did tell repeatedly was about an incident with a German soldier. It seems toward the end of the war a small group from his platoon were gathered in a large house near some woods. A young German soldier came walking with trepidation out of the woods. He did not have a gun and was probably very worried about what was about to happen. The Gls told him to join them and took him inside. They talked for hours about war-wondering why leaders started wars, and they shared about their homes and families. They shared their names. This prisoner, Hans, gave Ralph his photo and wrote down his address. Ralph made hot chocolate for the young man. This was Ralph's story from the war: he made hot chocolate for a prisoner of war. Ralph showed kindness and hospitality.

The story is not over yet. Now is when the story gets even more interesting. Ralph's third son, Warren, is a retired teacher and a big history buff. Sometime in 2008 or 2009 he started researching his dad's time in the service. Ralph passed away at the age of 60 in 1978 and was no longer around to quiz about the war. So, Warren did research. When Warren tackles a project, he doesn't do it halfway. He created a website www.oldhickory30th.com. He spent

years researching to learn more about the 30th Division during WWII. This included trips to the National Archives in College Park, Maryland, time at the Archives in St. Louis, trips to the 30th Division Museum in Florida. He gathered many documents, maps, and photos, which he shared on his website. This led to requests from families around the country asking for specific information on where their loved one had served and died. Warren helped many, many families learn about their family members' time in the war.

Back to Ralph's story: Warren included on the website the young POW's name and address from the photo that Ralph brought home. A German researcher saw this and actually found Hans after all these years. Warren wrote to him. Hans was still living and had his daughter write a letter back to Warren, thanking Warren for reaching out to find him. The daughter reported that her father was delighted to receive a letter from Warren. She said that as children they were told the story of the American soldier who "spoke to him so friendly and treated him so well." It seems in Germany there is a book about the war and what happened to the POWs in Hans' city. And Ralph is mentioned in the book, just as Hans is mentioned on Warren's website and in the book Warren wrote. The daughter went on to tell what Hans had done with his life after serving time as a POW.

This story is a treasure for our family, and a family in Germany. Two families share this incident. It shows that amid war, good men will show kindness, even to the "enemy." And thanks to Warren, we know this story.

VETERANS DAY—NOV. 11TH

Veterans Day (originally known as Armistice Day) is a federal holiday in the United States observed annually on November 11, for honoring military veterans of the United States Armed Forces. It coincides with holidays in several countries, including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day, which also occur on the anniversary of the end of World War I. Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 when the Armistice with Germany went into effect. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.

Veterans Day is distinct from Memorial Day, a U.S. public holiday in May: Veterans Day commemorates the service of all U.S. veterans, while the older Memorial Day, which grew out of Civil War commemorations, specifically honors those who have died while in military service.

Hanging of the Greens

"Hanging of the Greens" is a Christian tradition that marks the beginning of the Advent and Christmas season by decorating a church or home with evergreens.

Symbolic meanings of the decorations

Evergreens: Symbolize eternal life and the unending nature of God, mirroring the coming of Christ and the hope of His return.

Wreaths: The circular shape of a wreath, often made of evergreens, represents God's eternal, unending love.

Colors: The traditional color for Advent is purple (signifying the sacred and spiritual fulfillment), though some traditions use blue (representing anticipation and promise).

We will be having **Hanging of the Greens** on **November 23rd**, immediately after the worship service. Everyone is invited to help decorate our church for this joyous season as we prepare our hearts and sanctuary for Advent.

NOVEMBER BOOK REVIEWS

UWFaith Book Selections

The social action book selected for this month is <u>The New American</u>, a novel written by Micheline Aharonian Marcom and inspired by interviews with Central American refugees. This is the story of a Guatemalan American college student who learns he is undocumented when he is deported and then his journey to return to California, the only home he has ever known.

The spiritual growth selection is <u>Abuelita Faith: What Women on the Margins Teach Us about Wisdom, Persistence, and Strength</u>. The author, Kat Armas, is a second-generation Cuban American who grew up on the outskirts of Miami's Little Havana neighborhood. Her earliest theological formation came from her grandmother, her abuelita, who fled Cuba during the height of political unrest and raised three children alone. Armas shows us how voices on the margins have more to teach us about following God than we realize. (*Christianity Today* 2022 Book Award finalist)

The final pick was a *New York Times* bestseller, <u>Before We Were Yours</u>, by Lisa Wingate, under the nurturing for community category. The lives of three children living on a riverboat are forever changed when taken by strangers and thrown into an orphanage on a night when their mother is rushed to a hospital. This novel is based on real-life history of baby farms, orphanages, adoption practices, Georgia Tann, and the scandal surrounding the Tennessee Children's Home Society in Memphis, TN, and set in 1939.





Ad Fontes Media Bias Chart

In our adult Sunday School Class, we sometimes talk about current news events. There are many sources for news. How do we become "good consumers" of the news and the information it contains?

Is a story written using verified fact or is it just the author's opinion? How can we know?

Look at the Ad Fontes Media Bias Chart using the internet address listed. It is interactive which means you can change the size or zoom in on certain areas.

The news sources shown at the TOP of the chart are written using thorough fact reporting and/or dense fact analysis. This means the writings are based on solid and verifiable work and research.

Is a news story written to represent a certain point of view?

I want to know if a story's point of view (bias) is: middle-of-the-road? left-skewed? right-skewed?

On the chart, locate the news sources according to their location from right to left. If the source is near the middle, that represents a story that is "middle-of-the-road" or neutral on bias.

The same indicators apply to sources listed on the left or right side of the screen. Their bias is skewed either to the left or to the right.

Here are some examples:

Associated Press (AP) apnews.com primarily fact with neutral bias

PBS News Hour https://www.pbs.org/newshour/ slight "left" bias in opinion

NewsNation Network https://www.newsnationnow.com --- slight "right" bias in opinion

Reflection by Jamie Horning

I have been reflecting about Grace the past few weeks. It has been a year since we got full power in the west end of the church. To celebrate we had a potluck on a Saturday night. After the meal, Pastor Michael talked about the light. How some people are so close to light that they cannot see the world around them or what God is doing. While others are so far away they cannot see the light nor see the world around them because of darkness. And then there are the ones who are at the right distance. God knew we would need someone youthful, talented and can think outside the box. About a month and a half after Pastor Michael came, Satan sent the flood. But with Michael's leadership, talents and volunteering by so many members, we were able to continue being a church, worshipping and fellowshipping.

Not only did we regain electrical power in the rest of the church. God brought more children to Wednesday night's Children's Ministry. Thru the Winter, Spring and Summer God has brought us new people into the church. God was, is and will always be with Grace. God is awesome and I can't wait to reflect again in another year.
